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#### About Bhoomika Vihar

**Bhoomika Vihar** is a community based grass root organization has actively been working in Bihar State,

Country India, for the promotion and protection of the rights and dignity of marginalized section adolescent girls. Bhoomika Vihar was formally registered in 1996 under the Societies Registration Act, 1860.

Bhoomika Vihar is a woman headed organization. Most of the leadership positions are leaded by girls/women. Victims, survival and vulnerable girls/women are performing actively their leadership position in bringing change especially for **breaking the cycle of victimization** for them and for other girls. We especially are working with marginalized section vulnerable girls as they are the**1**<sup>st</sup> Generational Learners. We lead with the concept "Replace Broom with Books and Pen.... Change Will Take Place." Recently 45 girls are pursuing Graduation. They are Ist generational graduates.

**We believe** – The girls are our present and future so there is need to involve them with the process of understanding, decision-making, responsibility and ownership. Any Investment in a girl child can reap multiple rewards in future.

Theory of Change of Bhoomika Vihar basically revolves around working with disadvantage section of society especially with Adolescent girls leading with Triangle Approaches "Preventive- Curative-Advocacy." This basically led to overall mainstreaming of adolescent girl at social, educational and economical level. Placing girls in leadership position at Preventive, Curative and Advocacy level, we actually are confronting the biased mindset and **Creating Role Models as Chain of Change Makers.** This led to motivate and inspire a life with respect and dignity, breaking the cycle of victimization and poverty. Children/girls in need of care and protection are getting involved with constructive approaches and multidisciplinary services for social and educational mainstreaming.

#### **Triangle Approach**

Marriage usually seen as an institution spells happiness and opens the door of prosperity for the generation to come. But sadly the marginalized section poor adolescent girls who are illiterate, innocent have to face the hard realities of fake or forced marriage which is totally against their dreams and desires. Simultaneously on the other side the age old person who are twice/thrice older in comparison to his bride, very smoothly plans getting the support from the local touts how to exploit her bride after fake or forced marriage.

Absolute negligence of basic care and educational requirements of the girl children, forcing them for fake marriage, mismatch marriage and selling them off to agents by family members, prevalence of stereotypes are some aspects of discrimination faced by girls in Bihar especially the marginalized section girls are the worst sufferers. The girl child is

discriminated against in all spheres of life and considered a burden on the family. The attitude is symbolized by rampant female infanticide and continues through the development process of the girl child as discrimination in love, nutrition, health and education. Consequently, girls develop a low self-esteem, relinguish control over their own lives and often end up meek and powerless to resist the might of patriarchy and an easy prey to exploitation.

Triangle Approach envisions increasing girls and women aptitude to prevent and respond to fake, forced and early marriage through life skill knowledge, creating livelihood opportunities, keeping coordination with multiple stakeholders, making the society accountable

Overall to be proactive as Change Makers Girls

Equipping girls with education and skills training may help protect them and future generations from abuse. Interventions prioritizing investments in girls' education, and their safe enrollment, also had consistently lower rates of violence against women overall. Girls who are educated are much more likely and able to advocate for their health and safety as well as the health of their families.

When girls are free from violence and fully participating in their education and community development issues; the benefits are boundless.

#### Rational

Discrimination against women starts from womb and ends up to tomb. When she comes out of four walls, she remains unaware to the threats coming to greet her life. Being a girl she faces the double standard within the four walls or outside. Either while living in the home or while going out-sides for education.

Youths have been the forefront of activism, demonstrating extraordinary zeal to address social issues. Bhoomika Vihar makes effort to project the Young girls as Agent of change makers through combining their potential energy and with the committed vision of the organization for social action and community mobilization. Therefore, there is need for the younger girls and boys for taking crisis intervention with preventive skills in mainstreaming the vulnerable or survivals with leadership.

Adolescent girls are particularly vulnerable. Helping them to build assets and skills can give them more options to negotiate in their lives, importantly around the prevention of trafficking, child marriage and other forms of violence. It is an empowerment, leadership and participatory follow up activity that will work with girls to develop strong character and life skills knowledge. This is a concept about helping girls come up with their ideas, build teams and have the joy of learning by doing and experimenting their imaginations. Team spirit is a way through which Girls feel involved, committed, powerful and happy. They get interacted on the issues related to the types and consequences of fake/forced marriage. This would be a process to build a cadre of well informed and empowered girls with sensitized leadership to take collective action against fake/forced marriage.

## Gender Responsive Boys

Real change must start at home. "If a boy sees his father treating his sisters and mother with respect, he will pick up on it; if he sees his father beating his mother up, there's a much higher chance that Generally females themselves have been the core target of gender sensitization camp. But it really very practice that male members play one of the prime role in supporting the gender discrimination and traditional orthodox practices in dealing with the girls. If it is a say that the male members influence the decisions of the house, he can also play strong role in bringing change to the ratio of gender discrimination. We need to start looking for ways to engage boys and girl

jointly so that they start to see the value in equal opportunities for girls.

The role of communication is essential for the success of the expanded intervention of the Project. It is the process of exchanging information, ideas, thoughts and feelings between two people or among a group of people using different approaches-. The exchange allows them to receive immediate response or feedback that can lead to mutual understanding, agreement and joint action.

## Baseline Studies and village level meeting with local stakeholders

This is basically to identifying the status of child marriage, child labor, migration, trafficking, education, socio-economic aspects, and availability of livelihood, daily earners, and children living without parental care.

Data collection facilitates implementation of activities – identification of vulnerable households, reaching out to maximum number of households, appropriate activity reaching out to the most deserving household, enabling maximum impact from the intervention.

### **Success Story**

Age about 15 yrs old; R Kumari was mired by fraud by a local woman. Misguided and forcefully marriage took place and R kumari was sold off to another hand for the purpose of fake marriage. In December 2015, the parents of R were offered by a local woman to roam outside of village. They were said not to worry about the travel expense as the woman was going to bear it. The women had lied to them[R family] that she had an offer to roam outside free of cost. And she wanted to support the poor family.

The family was completely being misguided by the cleaver women and reaches to Samstipur dist, as they were said they were about to travel, outside of Bihar. Parents were illiterate but R There are number of cases when the team members intervened and the marriage was stopped. Though it is a new intervention, sometimes it had been complicated even to make the people understand the legal age of marriage or marriage consequences if it's happening with outsider grooms. Working of children in field and as domestic worker is a common routine for the maximum households.

In some places, PRI members supported the team in making the parents or community understand the threat of early or forced marriage and importance of education. These cases are the sample to understand the marriage age of the girls taking place in the community. Though, it has been difficult to make the father understand the importance of freedom for a girl.

kumati easily recognize the wrong destination reading the name of the district, displayed in the respective station. Again the family was confused by the woman saying that they were going to have rest for some moment.

As they walks in a strange family, number of male members started to interrogate them asking a series of rubbish questions. They were threatened to be ready for R kumar marriage other they would be shot. Even one of the male members was keeping a weapon. Marriage took place with an unknown older person.

A little later, the parents were pressurized to go back. After coming back they had tried once to bring her daughter back but not succeeded. The family where her daughter was kept forcefully said that they had bought her in just Rs 30000[thirty thousand only]. Life was very tough for R kumari as she was being abused by her so called husband and other male members of the house. She was beaten up by sticks after denial. Her food was stopped for 2-3 days.

The family later on had requested to Bhoomika Vihar for support. Upon request, the parents were at least become ready to share the incidence with local PRI especially to Panchayat Nyay Samiti[ panchayat level local body who is responsible to look after the cases related to children and women]. We as a local facilitator paid our responsibility to make the access of the family to the Panchayat. Panchayat had called a special meeting and the wicked woman was informed to

make her presence during the meeting. She was already alert as she left the village keeping her family there.

Community pressure especially the involvement of PRIs, community based support structures and other stakeholders had really worked out. R kumari was sent back. We are in phase to work closely with them so that they would not be victimized again. Counseling is going on. She is under watch of our team members. She now is living with her family and continuing her education of class 8. Poverty and helplessness make them mere recipient of victim and fraud. Family is getting economical support as her mother is interested to start business of seasonal vegetable. Economical independency of female members makes them decision makers to avoid any misfortune.

16 yrs old Sita is a student of class 8 <sup>th</sup> . Her study was stopped as her parents had decided to get her married. Getting the information while conducting survey, the team members had to get involved and tried to make the parents understand the actual age of marriage. They even informed them on Anti Child Marriage law. The mediators were also informed on the same. Making effort repeatedly, the parents finally changed their decision. Sita had started schooling again.	15 yrs old Rekha had to take stand against her parent's decision regarding her marriage. As a group leader of Kishori Samuh she better understand her responsibilities to oppose child marriage taking place in her respective village. She also did that taking help from the local girls and local volunteers. She convinced her parents about her future life and further education. Now she actively had been engaged in making the local community aware to the consequences of early and forced marriage.
14 yrs old Janki marriage was almost decided. She as a member of Kishori Samuh get involved and informed on threats of early marriage or importance of education. She shared her situation during the Kishori Samuh meeting. She even requested the team or the girls to take action against the marriage. Girls in a group reached her house. They tried to convince her mother and father, too. When senior team members involved, the marriage had to stop. Janki is happy now and continuing her study.	15 yrs old Savitri marriage was decided. According to her father, girl's marriage should take place as early as possible. Otherwise it would be difficult to find out a groom. Again the local volunteers had to intervene during conducting survey in the village. She also had shown strength and opposed the marriage getting support from the team members. Marriage was stopped and now she is continuing her study.
16 yrs old Sangita is a student of class 10 <sup>th</sup> . Some relatives were finalizing the marriage date when the team was doing household survey. Team had started to convince the relatives. No one was ready to even listen to them. They had to inform the ward members and thus the marriage was stopped.	Life of 15 yrs old Runiya, 17 yrs old Nitu and 16 yrs old Gita was saved due to the swift action taken by the team members. In these cases, role of the local girls has been tremendous. As they had played active role in convincing the parents of the girls who had decided to get their daughters married in teenage.

## Minor girls under the pretext of marriage are being easily victimized to work as bonded labor/ cheap labor in the day and sex slave at night.

Local Women proactively working in Koshi belt as traffickers. It becomes easy for the women to convince the targeted poor family under the guise of marriage. Families with less education and exposure are the soft target for the local touts.

In early morning of 2nd May 17, a 12 yrs old girl informed the local female volunteers of Bhoomika Vihar about the planning taking place at her home. They were about to fix her marriage with an unknown outsider older man.

The female volunteers approached Hemant Kumar, senior team member of Bhoomika Vihar, and arrived at her house. Preparation was already under way by the local female tout. The 12 yrs old girl was about to get marriage in the night. Targeted family was offered of 25000[twenty five thousands] cash and financial support for making brick house after marriage. A local women whose daughter had already been married in Uttar Pradesh, had proposed to the groom

and brought it along. The woman had already got some money on advance and rest was to meet after marriage. The woman had given shelter to the groom at her house. She enticed a family who are agricultural labor and Mahadalit by cast.

After that, lady broker and the groom were brought to the Panchayat Bhawan and the local Police was informed. They reached Police Station by 3:00 pm. FIR Lodged by BHOOMIKA VIHAR Team Case No- 123/17, dated 12/05/17 Section- 370/373 of IPC Police Station- Kodha Thana, District- Katihar *Two Traffickers Arrested* 

Finally the case got registered by 11:30 night. Lady broker and the outsider trafficker are in jail. Police verification is going on.

It has come to know that the lady broker had sold number of girls under the pretext of marriage. Bhoomika Vihar team is also doing ground work in looking for more witnesses so that the culprits would get punished. Case has also been referred to District Child Protection Unit for coordinated follow up in further steps.
They often come drunk and abused her sexually. A Khatoon, age 22 years, was married with Md. Badrool from Zokihaat Block of Araria district. A close relative had introduced the groom saying that he would be staying locally and won't go away from the village.

He was lying completely. Suddenly after three months, her husband however managed to move to Punjab along with her.

After sometimes Badrool started torturing her. A was trying to adjust but situation had become more complicated especially when his local friends had started to stay night there. While these, she also gave birth a son. He with his friends beat her up and coerced her to keep silence. They often come drunk and abused her sexually. She was threatened that she would be sold off to another hand, if she deny or oppose. She was not allowed to go outside or to interact to anybody else.

However seeing the situation becoming adverse she managed to inform her father about her condition, with the help of some neighbours. She ran away from the place with her small kid. Now, She is residing with her parents in Araria and trying to earn some money for her little kid and herself by selling vegetables. Bhoomika Vihar is helping financially to make life easy and respectable for her and her little kid. She is too young. She would be a victim a trafficking again if she would not have a alternative livelihood option.

She was lured and later on cast in the brewery 20 years old D Devi married to an outsider person living in Kota Rajesthan. That person was much older than D Devi. Groom was introduced by a local resident who was also a close relative of them. The middleman lured the family saying that the groom has own house in Kota and he runs a fruit shop there. Marriage expenses would be borne by the groom, as promised and later on groom had also paid the amount. Family agreed as the close relative was got involved in convincing them. Marriage took place. Devi went Kota, Rajesthan. Whatever she observed was completely against the statement given by the middle man or the groom. Her husband was involved in liquor making and forced her also to make it. There was nothing but a small hut in which locally constructed liquor shop was running. There was a rush of drunkards, all day.

She was being tortured and abused, mentally and sexually. She had no choice as she was alone and helpless. In the mean time she became pregnant but the situation remains the same. Groom was no worried about the child as he always said that he was not the father. She even was not allowed to contact to her parents.

Getting chance a day, she however manages to inform her brother by phone and returns back to her village.

After coming back she gave birth to a baby girl. Her family was also facing financial crunch. She later on got involved with Bhoomika Vihar. She after getting financial support, started the purchasing and selling of seasonal vegetables in the local market.

#### Alternative Care Model with the children living without parental care

The purpose of this project is to reduce the vulnerability and suffering of Orphan or Semi Orphan children and build their lives by involving them with regular education, develop positive, protective & supporting environment, and life skills step by step until they are to the age and form where they are able to contribute productively and positively back to their own lives, family and to the society. Schooling would be high on the list as a critical criterion in determining which child is extremely or modestly vulnerable and in need.

Responding to the above, Bhoomika Vihar intervened with the objective of providing better future prospects in the true sense of educational and social mainstreaming of orphans and children with single parents (often mother).

It covers 110 children [orphan or semi orphan]. The project provide the children a platform where the children can feel their childhood through playing, joyful learning, open discussion with free of mind. The children are admitted to local government school for regular education and we are tremendously excited to share that they are doing par excellently in their studies. In fact, going beyond our reservations, most of them have topped their classes either in overall performance or in individual subjects. Many are shining brilliantly on the sports field too in their school. Our aim is to give them the best possible education until they achieve a basic college degree and are able to provide for their own lives or families positively

• Empowering beneficiaries including children and parents while enhancing community participation by promoting better learning environments at Maike Centres that are child-friendly and by developing positive environment through multi dimensional activities for the children and the local community.

Individual follow up plan with appropriate & relevant input developed for project beneficiaries, based on their presentation. 110 Children with their present guardian were constantly being encouraged to be the part of the Review Exercise. Questionnaire developed to conduct review exercise with the project beneficiaries. Individual sharing of project beneficiaries initiated based on day to day life experience while interacting with family, friend, school and community. Local Advocacy and home visit done with the families of the vulnerable children and the villagers

This is an initiative to develop a coordination and interaction with the local community and to make them aware to the aim and objective of the project. This helps in taking the support of the villagers for project implementation.

Sometimes the dates match with each other. At that time, joint celebration initiates.

# Backup Education to the Children

110 most vulnerable children are getting monthly support as back up education. Concern support also helps in bearing expenses pertaining to their cloth, medicine, etc. It has been noticed that monthly support to the children has been becoming the and significant tool strategy in developing the importance of the orphan children among their present guardian. Regular support helps such *Out of 110 Children, 42 Children are continuing Primary Education and 12 Continuing Higher Education.* 

Monthly stipend in - fact motivates the children to get involved to regular education. It also endeavors to create opportunities for higher education of these children by getting them admitted into other local govt. and govt. aided schools after the completion of their primary education.

children in overall mainstreaming with dignity especially in developing the confidence level. Support accelerates in mainstreaming the children with community. Multidimensional support to the children helps in developing hope and confidence and reducing vulnerability. Once these children are brought up and cared for them eventually, through their education and the skills gained become responsible people in

the Nation.

# Fulfilling the Basic Needs of the children/girls

Some Specific items such as personal hygiene related requirement and daily use needs are given to the children/girls to ensure the well being of the children. Concern activity helps them in developing personal hygienic practices among the children.



# Community based support structure

Community based support structures in the form of Community Safety Net and Peer Groups developed in the project area. It is an existing village or community committee that can effectively take on the added responsibility of ensuring child protection at village level. It is assumed that members of community based structures get motivated to participate by giving their individual involvement. Local ownership is essential and we trust through community mobilization this can be achieved through forming the committees. It is expected that on creating awareness of the plight of the orphan/semi orphan children, need for support of the project received by the community based structures so that together we can be able to achieve our objectives

Playing cards with questionnaire have been developed to make the girls aware to the threats of child marriage and trafficking, safe mobility and gender and rights concern issues

# Awareness Generation and Sensitization

Multi- State holder awareness generating cum sensitization campaign stimulates to make the concern people aware to the plight of the orphan/semi orphan children in need of support and care.

Multi- stake holders are informed, mobilized and capacitated to initiate dialogue at various platforms on the importance of alternative care and need of community based protection to the vulnerable children.

BCC in turn provides a supportive environment which enables people to initiate, sustain and maintain positive and desirable behavior outcomes for project and target the project beneficiaries. Mass awareness rising on care and protection of orphan/semi orphan children and promotion of behavior change must form a prominent part of the overall communication strategy. Information, especially in the key area of care and protection of children needs to be provided to the different section stake holders.

1500 folder related to child rights and protection developed and printed 40 cultural shows held on preventive measure 200 pieces of Tea Mug covering girl child rights and protection

22 Cluster level meetings held with 1980 people involving the local ward members, school teachers, personals of govt/semi govt schemes and programs, local villagers and the parents of the project beneficiaries to address common concern and issues related to the orphan/semi orphan children and influence social change

2 Regional level meeting organizes with 296 people involving PRI members, local CBOs, Youth Clubs, women groups, media, local representatives, opinion leaders on Alternative care. Participants are informed on Parwarish Schemes and the need of care and protection to vulnerable children. Discussion initiates strengthening in appropriate methodology for providing local level protection to the children.

## Good Practices Sharing Workshop at State Level

Good Practices Sharing Workshop organized with the Policy makers, Regional NGOs, CBOs, INGOs, college students, academia, and media personals from print and electronic media. 210 participants took part in

This had led to ensure the presentation of good practices of the project. Individual sharing from the project beneficiaries did on real-life experiences that illustrate how the children/girls are striving for social and educational mainstreaming.

### Convergence with local systems

Regular interaction with the local systems such as CWC and DCPU took place for building relationship, rappo-building, alliance building and for making them sensitized Children interacted with District Child Protection Systems and enriched with knowledge on preventive and curative mechanism of child protection

towards orphan/semi orphan children. Especial interactive session initiated with the concern systems involved the project beneficiary



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## **Success Stories**

6 years old, a little girl, Soni, her parents are not alive. She is struggling for life and a way goes towards fulfilling her dreams and hopes.

*Her parents died just after her birth. Acute illness was the main reason of dying. She does not remember anything regarding her parents.* .

When she was 3 years old, she got involved with us. Normal behavior was not being seen by her, at that time. She just could not react like other children. It had become an uphill effort to see smile on her face.

She was taken to play with other children to bring natural appearance. She was got enrolled to Maike Centre [mainstreaming centre run by us]. After that she enrolled to local school. Presently she is studying class one. She has been taken care of by her paternal grandparents. She receives monthly stipend and other personal related daily use stuff. She today is engrossed with her friends.

This is the age when children are sent to shepherd instead of schooling. In such situation, it becomes tough to motivate the children of rural area to school. Particularly to work with the children living without parental care is more difficult. Relatives try to keep the children as house maid. No one is concern or anxious regarding the present or future of these children.

This little Angel is really an inspiration for the children living

17 years old Baby Kumari belongs to a poor family.

When she was in the age of 5, her father died due to acute illness. Situation became more complicated. She with her mother had to work in field to feed the younger brothers and sisters. She was also working as housemaid to maintain the education related expenses.

She got involved with Bhoomika Vihar team. Seeing her enthusiasm for education, she linked up with monthly stipend for quality education.

Local resident had tried to take benefit of her family helplessness and poverty sometimes through giving marriage proposal with an outsider or job offer in big cities. She always refused, as she is an active leader of Kishori Samuh. She speaks on self defense.

She after completing higher education dreams of getting a better employment. She presently pursues Intermediate. 15 years old Seromani is studying in class 8<sup>th</sup>.

Her father died when she was a child. She with her mother, two brothers and 2 sisters took shelter at her maternal grand- parents. Elder sister got married quickly due to ignorance and dependency on others for upbringing. She was always forced by her relatives to work as labor to maintain the domestic expenses.

While a meeting, she got interacted with the local volunteers. She after that started to get monthly stipend for quality education. She took admission in a local coaching class to complete the syllabus. Being an active member of Kishori Samuh she performs as a leader of girl's group.

While these, she with her mother went out to attend a marriage ceremony, outside the district. Relatives have convinced her mother for a marriage proposal. Her mother returned home leaving Seromani at relative's house. As Seromani was not aware of this. After the commitment from her mother's side, the boy [bride] started to force her to get in his house. When she comes to know, she refused and informed the local volunteers. Local volunteers later on discussed with the mother and grandparents of Seromani on the threat and law of child marriage

Volunteers had also informed the PRI members and a team involving the grandparents of Seromani reached there to protect Seromani. She is back now.

Her intelligence and awareness had saved her from becoming a victim of child marriage.
